

June 13, 2021 *Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)* Ez 17:22–24 2 Cor 5:6–10 Mk 4:26–34



To What Shall We Compare the Kingdom of God?

Today's readings are rich with answers to this question posed in Mark's Gospel. The prophet Ezekiel selects the metaphor of a cedar tree. Like such a tree, the kingdom of God begins as a tender shoot planted on a high mountain where it can grow unimpeded by other growth. There it will grow tall and firm, boasting many branches, rich with fruit, the home to various species of birds. The Gospel writer chose another metaphor—that of a small seed. This parable characterizes the inconspicuous nature of the kingdom's origin. We may not see it in the beginning because it is so small and surrounded by soil, but it contains within itself the force of life that someday will burst forth into a rich harvest.

The mustard seed is a special kind of seed. Today's Gospel calls it "the smallest of all the seeds on the earth" (Mark 4:31). However, following the pattern of growth that is hidden in the core of its being, it also brings forth one of the marvels of nature, producing "the largest of plants" (Mark 4:32). Metaphors also underscore the fact that these seeds must first transform, lose the appearance of a seed in order to rise, filled with the mysterious character of its growth. All of this happens quietly, unpretentiously, as if under the cover of night.

These are very moving metaphors, quite easy to understand and envision. However, the reality for which the metaphors stand is sometimes very difficult to realize because of human selfishness. Still, it is God's tree, God's seed, God's kingdom, and it is God who declares: "As I, the LORD, have spoken, so will I do!" (Ezekiel 17:24).





What is ReConnect?

The ReConnect Street Intervention Program is part of the YMCA. They have been providing short term and long-term assistance for several years, through outreach to youth and adults who are homeless or at risk of being homeless. Through immediate charitable action and work to

help individuals develop choices and approaches in their life that will help them be more self-sufficient. ReConnect partners with downtown merchants, community organizations and local churches to ensure that overall community needs are being addressed as well as the needs of those they are helping. ReConnect often meets individuals and families at times of crisis, so they are addressing issues with food, safe housing, employment, and counseling. The downtown churches gather monthly with ReConnect to receive updates on their interventions, hear about services and resources available and consider ways that we can be of assistance.

Celebrating the Year of St. Joseph



Pope Francis has declared this the year of Saint Joseph. One of the many things Saint Joseph is known for is providing for the Holy Family. With this in mind, the Adult Faith Commission is seeking to partner with organizations who are working to feed those less fortunate in our

community. We recently met with Alicia Clarkson from the Peter McKee Community Garden and she gave a wonderful presentation on the work they are currently doing and their plans for the future.

When asked what their most pressing needs are she responded with *"seeds and funding"*. Some of the seeds they would be looking for are *Carrots* (Tenderly Imperator, Scarlet nantes), *Lettuce* (Buttercrunch, Little Gem, Romaine) and *Tomato* (Prudens Purple, San Morzano). Also, gift cards to hardware stores or garden centers are always useful.

As far as funding. They currently have 101 Garden Boxes on the go; of the 101, only 16 are currently being sponsored. You can sponsor a box for \$200 for the year. This will provide seeds, soil and maintenance, updates, a charitable tax receipt, and the good grown in your name will go to the food bank, or a family in need. Also, for the \$200 there will be a sign put up with the information of the sponsor.

Statement by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops on the recent discovery at the former Kamloops Indian Residential School in the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc First Nation

On behalf of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB), I express our deep sorrow for the heartbreaking loss of the children of the former Kamloops Indian Residential School in Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc First Nation.

The news of the recent discovery is quite heartbreaking. It brings back trauma to many communities across this country.

Honoring the dignity of these little ones who lost their lives requires that the truth be brought to light. This tragedy deeply affects indigenous communities, with whom many people across this country and around the world now stand in solidarity.

As these events rekindle the suffering of a painful past, the Bishops of Canada pledge to continue their walk side by side with Indigenous Peoples in the present, in search of greater healing and reconciliation for the future.

We raise our prayers to the Lord for the children who have lost their lives and we commit ourselves to diligently accompany indigenous families and communities.

May our Creator God bless us with comfort and hope.

Dear Padre,

I care for my mother, who has dementia. I was active in my parish, but now I hardly have a minute to spare for prayer, much less helping out at church. I'm getting very depressed. What should I do?

have several ideas. First, make your prayer life part of your mother's routine, and you'll find it easier to fit prayer into your day. People with dementia find it soothing to listen to repetitive prayer, so consider praying the rosary aloud in her presence. Sometimes people with advanced dementia can still remember and recite the Our Father and the Hail Mary, so you could end up praying the rosary together. That would truly be a gift.

Next, try reading aloud Scripture stories from a youth Bible. They'll be easier for her to understand than passages from an adult Bible, and you'll get some time with God's word.

Last, but absolutely not least, it's important for you to be connected. If your parish has a parish nurse, he or she can help you find respite care, in which someone takes your place with your mom so you can get away for a while, or
