

Isn't That a Bit Extreme?

No sacrifice is too extreme in pursuit of a dream. We will forego sleep, the enjoyment of a favorite pastime, the company of good friends—even the pleasure of good food. Ask anyone who has spent hours preparing for a recital, trying out for a position on an athletic team, or studying for an entrance exam. The same is true when one's livelihood is involved. Ask farmers, people in the military, teachers, or healthcare workers. Ask new parents, or even those who have been at it for a long time. If we really value something or someone, no sacrifice is too great—at least for a while—when that cherished goal is in view.


We don't seem as willing to forfeit comfort when negative inclinations are involved, and we all have them: rivalry, jealousy, fury, selfishness, slander, gossip, conceit, to name a few. We know that such pettiness or rank cruelty can harm us as well as those we offend, but too often we seem unwilling to restrain such inclinations.


In today's Gospel passage, Jesus speaks quite strongly to such reticence. Does he really expect us to maim ourselves? Isn't that a bit extreme? The fact is, when we try to purge ourselves of reprehensible behavior it is like cutting off our hand or plucking out our eye. Ask anyone who deals with an addiction. If Jesus asks this of us, it means that we certainly have the strength to do it.





Let Us Love One Another A Three-Part Journey of Reconciliation

The recent, and continuing, uncovering of the horrific treatment of some of our Indigenous brothers and sisters at Residential Schools has left many of us struggling to deal with all the emotions that this has evoked. Feelings of anger, disillusion, and uncertainty as to how to move forward as a church are among many things we are trying to sort out. With this in mind, we are offering three evenings of prayer and discernment where people can come together and come to God to find a path forward.

The three themes of these gatherings will be Reconciliation, Healing, and Remembrance and Promise, and the dates are as follows:

These will take place at **Holy Family Church** in Moncton 7 PM each night. All are welcome. Please note that we are not here to speak on anyone's behalf, but rather, to acknowledge that something went terribly wrong; to discern our part in it, and to voice our public concern in prayer.





World Day of Migrants and Refugees - September 26

A World Day of Migrants and Refugees is observed in many places in solidarity with the World Refugee Day promoted by the United Nations and observed since 2001 on 20 June. The January observance was instituted by Saint Pius X 1914. At the request of several conferences of Bishops, Pope Francis moved the observance to September in 2019. "The phenomenon of migration today is a providential opportunity for the proclamation of the Gospel in the contemporary world. Men and women from various regions of the

earth who have not yet encountered Jesus Christ or know him only partially, ask to be received in countries with an ancient Christian tradition. It is necessary to find adequate ways for them to meet and to become acquainted with Jesus Christ and to experience the invaluable gift of salvation." (POPE BENEDICT XVI, 2012)

New regulations regarding catechism gatherings

Due to concern around the rising numbers of COVID 19 cases in NB, new regulations have been announced by the government of NB. As per directives issued by the Honorable Dorothy Shephard, Minister of Health, the following guidelines have been determined by Archbishop Valéry Vienneau pertaining to the catechism of children:

All people 12 years of age and older will need to provide proof of vaccination to participate in in-person catechetical gatherings. If those presenting themselves are unknown to the catechist/ coordinator, government issued identification will also be required. This applies to catechists, parents and all adults who may be present at sessions. During in-person gatherings, masks must always be worn, although catechists may remove their masks for direct teaching, while maintaining a physical distance of 6 feet (2 metres) from the families. Those unvaccinated will be welcomed to participate in virtual catechetical sessions, via Zoom. The Zoom schedule and registration details are available from parish catechetical coordinators.

It has been a difficult 18 months for everyone as we navigate the pandemic. The situation continues to be fluid with frequent changes, which are frustrating for us all. However, the health and safety of families is of paramount importance. Therefore, as responsible citizens and Christians, it is imperative we follow the directions of public health officials. We thank everyone for their patience as we work to keep one another safe. Through all we are living, and how we are living it, please remember Jesus' words: "I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew, 28:20)

It is our hope that these forthcoming encounters – and the important collaboration and partnership that has supported the planning – will lead to a shared future of peace and harmony between Indigenous Peoples and the Catholic Church in Canada (CCCB Statement – Delegation to the Holy See, June 10, 2021). September 30th Orange Shirt Day

In 1973, 6-year-old Phyllis Webstad was living with her grandmother on the Dog Creek Indian Reserve in British Columbia and Phyllis was excited! In September, she was going to get to go to St. Mary's Residential School and although they didn't have much money, Phyllis' granny was going to buy her a new outfit for school! Phyllis remembers

going to the store and picking out a shiny orange shirt. It was bright and exciting – as excited as she was to be going to school!

When Phyllis got to the school though, they stripped her, and took away her clothes, including her new orange shirt. She never wore it again.

Now, every year on September 30th, Canadians are asked to wear orange to recognize and raise awareness about the time in our country's history when a little girl's feelings didn't matter and when no one seemed to care. Wearing Orange in September says to Phyllis and all Canadians, that we do, indeed, care.



Dear sisters and brothers in Christ Jesus: (September 24, 2021)

Yesterday evening, we received new directives from the NB Minister of Health regarding the sanitary measures to be implemented in our churches. The 4 bishops of NB agree on the following measures requested to make our churches as safe as possible for our faithful.

1. No proof of vaccination required for Sunday Masses, weekday Masses, baptisms, prayer groups and more.

However, the following measures will apply: Wearing a mask will be compulsory at all times.

- The occupancy capacity of your place of worship must be limited to 50% or less.
- A distance of two meters must be maintained between the different households present (family bubbles).
- Singing will not be allowed in the assembly. However, the songs of soloists and choir are allowed but respecting the 4 meters as before.
- The names and contact details of all those present should be recorded and the lists maintained.
- Have masks and bottles of disinfectant available at entrances, in the sanctuary and sacristy, etc.
- No one showing symptoms of COVID-19 or having been instructed to self-isolate should enter the place of worship.

2. Proof of vaccination required and maintained for weddings and funerals

All people will need to show full proof of vaccination when accessing certain events, such **as weddings**, **funerals**, conferences or workshops. Wearing a mask will be compulsory at all times. For funerals and weddings, there is no distancing required which allows for full capacity and there is no obligation to keep records for those present. But to be admitted, a person must have proof of full vaccination.

<u>For the catechesis</u> of children, we will follow the rules in force in the schools. Catechists should be fully vaccinated. When other adults attend meetings, they should also be doubly vaccinated. For a celebration in the church, we follow the rule in force in our churches.

It is very desirable that the <u>employees of the parish</u> be fully vaccinated. If not, they will need to wear a mask at all times and be tested for COVID periodically according to government policy.

For access to the <u>secretariat</u>, we will accept any person who comes there to obtain information or a service. If the person is not vaccinated, they will need to wear a mask.

We understand the concerns of Public Health and continue to collaborate by following the guidelines issued to reduce the transmission of COVID-19. We are all concerned about the current situation in the province. I am very grateful to all the parish priests and teams of volunteers who put everything in place to ensure the health and well-being of our faithful.

Dear Padre,

Isn't evangelization a role best left to religious professionals? I worry about being ridiculed if I try to spread the Good News. Any suggestions?

M any Catholics incorrectly assume that evangelization is not their job but a task for priests, deacons, or others serving in an official capacity. But it is helpful to remember that evangelization is more a matter of commitment rather than a specialized competence. The Gospel proclaims that a disciple must go out into the world and spread the Good News. Evangelization is the mission and purpose of the whole Church. It is doing



God's will and work on earth.

Your anxiety about being ridiculed may arise from a notion that others will reject information about Jesus Christ. This fear may be underestimating the powerful attraction of the Good News. This worry may be based on your own lack of confidence rather than the response of others. There are several ways for dealing

with this concern: First, acknowledge this fear and seek counsel and advice from someone who has overcome it. Second, remember that to help us offset these negative emotions we are all given the fruits of the Holy Spirit: joy, love, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Third, remember the future—God works in mysterious ways, and grace, though powerful, may take a long time to come to fruition.
