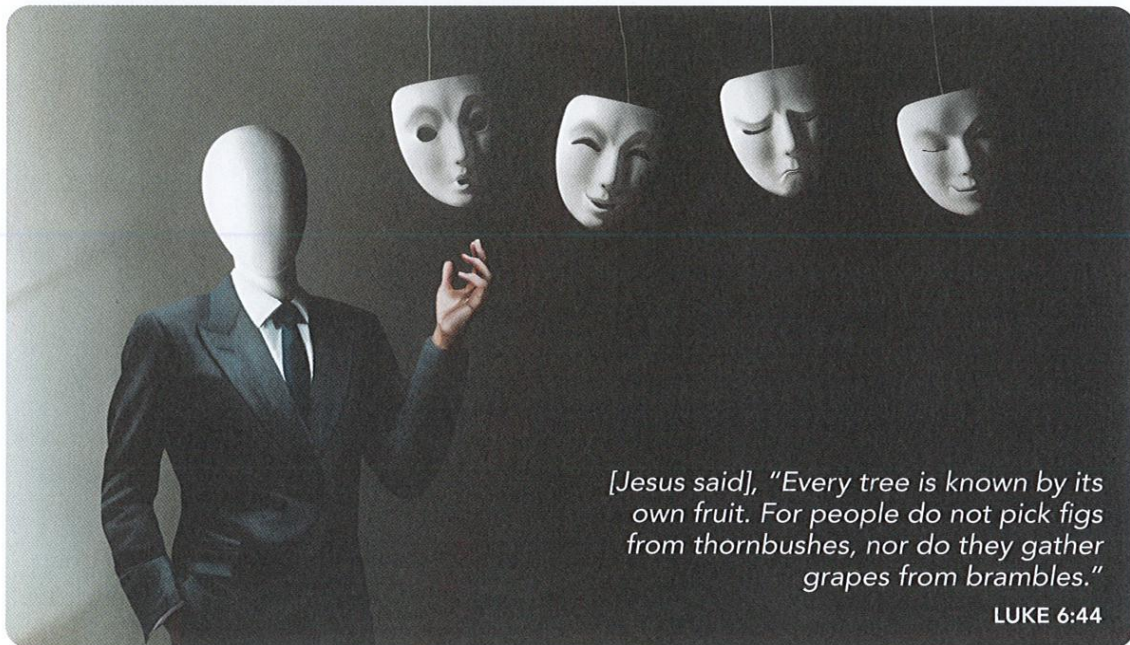

Sirach offers several examples of this. He claims that sometimes the dark side of our personalities comes out when we least expect it. But then there are times when we surprise even ourselves with our own goodness. Luke offers similar examples from both nature and human experience. Try as we might, we cannot completely hide who we truly are. And why should we? The last phrase of today's Gospel is profound: "From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks" (Luke 6:45). That is where we find who we are. Really!

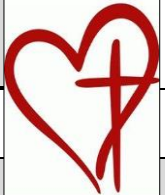

Lent.

a season of spiritual preparation

Remember that Lent is a joyful march toward Holy Easter and that all the readings, rituals and penitential practices are not done mournfully, ***but with the Risen Christ in mind and heart. Yet, it is also a time of ritual lamentation, of acknowledging the brokenness and pain in our lives and in our world.*** Lent allows us to articulate the grief and anger

we feel through prayer texts and song, to seek repentance and healing by turning to Christ, to do something concrete by works of charity, and to fast in order to give food to others. The prayer and action are the work of the entire community, children as well as adults. ***Prayer, fasting and almsgiving*** are not just Lenten disciplines – they are, rather, the year-round regimen of Christian living; the disciplines that many would say, form us as disciples. **Lent is like a retreat.** Throughout the year the church is directed out into the world, but during these 40 days we pull back into ourselves for reflection and self-examination. **We make ourselves “right with God”.**

My Lenten Journey

Now is a good time to make concrete resolutions towards a meritorious Lent. Prayerfully ponder ways you want to improve in your spiritual life. What can you do this Lent to foster and deepen your desire and efforts for the salvation of souls?

Ideas for Prayer, Reparation & Penance:

- Attend daily Mass (or virtually if you are shut in).
- Make frequent visits to the Eucharistic adoration chapel and/or to the Blessed Sacrament.
- Be more faithful to or increase your current holy hours.
- Make Acts of Spiritual Communion during the day.
- Invite or bring someone to Mass, Evening Prayer or adoration.
- Pray for a different person each day.
- Commit to going to frequent or regular Confession i.e. weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly. Choose a particular point or defect to overcome with a corresponding virtue to practice each month. Theological virtues: faith, hope, charity. Cardinal virtues: prudence, justice, temperance and fortitude. The Seven Capital Virtues: humility, generosity, chastity, meekness, temperance, brotherly love, diligence. Practice cheerfulness, politeness, courtesy, patience, thankfulness.
- Fast from sin and sinful habits
- Improve or begin the habit of making a daily Examination of Conscience followed by an Act of Contrition. Pick a regular daily time that works for you and stick to it i.e. right after you pray the daily family rosary
- Pray the Rosary or more rosaries alone or with a friend
- Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet in reparation for sin
- Commit one daily act of either a spiritual or corporal work of mercy
- Commit to fasting (i.e. Wednesdays, Fridays) and abstinence throughout Lent (i.e. unhealthy/junk food, processed food, sweets, refined sugar/foods, pop, caffeine, fast food etc.)
- Commit to a prescribed time of half an hour to an hour of daily physical exercise based on one's abilities – the Rosary and Chaplet of Divine Mercy could be prayed while exercising
- Refrain from or limit use of conventional and social media.
- Bless yourself, your family, and your residence with holy water at bedtime.
- Do your daily duties better and with a smile.
- Every day offer up little inconveniences, prayers and sacrifices for souls.
- Improve your family's emergency preparedness

"In His anguish He prayed even more earnestly, & His sweat fell to the ground like great drops of blood." (Luke 22:44) ***Jesus did this for us, let's give Him our best efforts this Lent.***

To facilitate Eucharistic Adoration, St. Bernard's will be open Monday through Friday from noon to one o'clock (12:00 -1:00), and on Sundays from two to three o'clock (2:00 – 3:00).



**On Wednesday, March 2, 2022
we once again begin the season of Lent**

How do we mark Lent in our churches? During Lent we emphasize some things by their **absence**. In the rituals of the Triduum we welcome back that which was absent; during the Easter season we give what was absent, renewed importance. Lent demands an apparent plainness that says, ***“This is a time to get back to basics”***. ***We concentrate on the basics of the Word and the Eucharist*** in order to prepare ourselves to renew our baptismal vows at Easter. Our efforts are meant to make more evident what is important about these 40 days: the assembly of the faithful, the penitents seeking reconciliation, and some years, candidates preparing to enter into communion with the Church and catechumens preparing for baptism during the Easter Vigil.

During the Lenten season, we do not sing “Alleluia”. The paschal candle is removed from the body of the church. Baptisms are not usually performed during Lent, except in an emergency. Some other Lenten traditions include the absence of flowers, greenery, plants and decorations. The sanctuary is as bare as possible.

Lent has a double purpose. It helps the catechumens to prepare for celebrating their baptism, confirmation, and the Eucharist at the Easter Vigil and invites those who are baptized to prepare through penance and prayer to renew their baptismal vows at the Vigil.

During Lent, it is especially important to realize the social consequences of sin as well as the fact that the heart of the virtue of penance is hatred of sin as an offence against God. Lenten penance should be external and social as well as internal and individual.

Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are not just Lenten disciplines – they are, rather, the year-round regimen of Christian living; the disciplines that, many would say, form us as disciples. During Lent, we try the best we can to get back to these basic disciplines.

Lent is like a retreat. Throughout the year the church is directed out into the world, but during these 40 days we pull back into ourselves for reflection and self-examination. We make ourselves “right with God”.



Lent – A sense of Season:

Lent is the yearly celebration by the Church of its corporate conversion in Jesus Christ. **The highest point in the Church’s year of prayer is the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil) celebrating the dying and rising of the Lord Jesus.** We prepare for this three-day period by the season of Lent and prolong it for the great 50 days of the Easter season. Together, Lent, the Triduum and the Easter season make up the “paschal season”, the springtime of the Church.

Ash Wednesday



Why do we wear ashes? Ashes symbolize sorrow and penitence. The early church ritualized this for those who had committed a serious or “capital” sin. These “penitents” would wear a penitential garment and have ashes sprinkled on them. Then they would be excluded from celebrating the Eucharist until the Easter Vigil. (Note that a person could be a penitent only once in a lifetime.) Although the order of penitents had declined, by 1091 all the faithful were encouraged to take on the practice of wearing ashes at the beginning of lent. Today we continue this practice as an expression of “our human condition as affected by sin” (Ceremonial of Bishops, 253). We mourn for “our sin and ignorance” (Responsorial for Ash Wednesday) that has kept us from keeping to our baptismal promises. We are marked with ashes

as a sign of our commitment to “turn away from sin and be faithful to the gospel” (Mk 1:15).

Where do the ashes come from? The rubrics for Ash Wednesday say that “the ashes used today come from the branches blessed the preceding year for Passion Sunday.” Though there is no special rite for burning palm branches, many communities have made a tradition of preparing their own ashes during the weeks before Lent.

How long do I have to wear these ashes? There is no rubric that states that ashes need to be worn outside of the Ash Wednesday liturgy, though you’ll see many smudged foreheads at work and on the streets on that day. The wearing of ashes is meant to be a sign of our inward conversion, and, as the Gospel of the day warns, not a way to gain applause. However, this could be a way to quietly evangelize our places of work and to find support from unknown fellow Catholics.

Is it a sin to not get ashes on Ash Wednesday? Some people believe that it is a sin to miss receiving ashes on this day. Some even believe that one would not go to heaven if he or she were not marked with blessed ashes. Neither is true. (Ash Wednesday is not even a holy day of obligation!) This of course does not mean that we shouldn’t participate in this liturgy, nor does it mean that the symbol isn’t important. Wearing ashes must reflect our desire to act from our baptismal promises. Saying “we believe” requires us to live dead to sin. Wearing ashes demands that we live alive for Christ.



Did you know...Ash Wednesday is a day of fasting & of abstinence from meat?

Christian fasting obtains its full meaning when we deprive ourselves of food in order to be more open for prayer, to share more in the suffering of those who are starving & to save money to give to the poor. The law of **abstinence** from meat binds those

who are 14 & older; the law of fasting binds those from 18 to 59 years of age. Parents and educators are reminded of their duty to introduce children gradually to the understanding and practice of penance.

Dear Padre,

Who chooses the names for Catholic churches?

The bishop is the appropriate authority to designate the name of a church in his diocese. Each church should have its own title, which cannot be changed after the church has been dedicated, except for grave reasons and with the approval of the Apostolic See (Canon 1218). Examples of designations include the name of the Blessed Trinity, a name for Christ or the Blessed Virgin Mary under a title already accepted in the liturgy, one of the angels, saints, or a blessed who is approved by the Holy See for insertion in a diocesan liturgical calendar.

According to additional norms issued in 1999, “If several parishes are suppressed and a new one is established using one of the churches, its title must be retained, but it may be changed if it is a new building.” Moreover, “if several parishes are each suppressed and united into one new parish, it is permitted, for pastoral reasons, to give it a new name different from the previous title of the parish church” (Canon 1218).



The faith community celebrates the titular feast of the church annually with the rank of a solemnity.

The customary practice of depositing a relic of the titular saint—when applicable—under the altar to be dedicated may be “fittingly retained” (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 302). However, the inherent dignity of the church’s altar is that it is foremost the table of the Lord.
