He Cannot Save Himself

S ome of us might wonder, as did many of the bystanders on the way to Calvary, why Jesus allowed matters to reach the point they did. We might ask: He saved others. Why didn't he save himself? Jesus certainly had the power. He demonstrated it often as he traveled the villages and countryside of Israel. Through the centuries, theologians have turned that question over and over, upside down and inside out. Hadn't he done enough to reveal his identity?

Every answer offered has thrown a bit of light on the question. Still, no answer has adequately resolved the issue. The question of Jesus' suffering and death is a mystery of our faith. Holy Week offers us an opportunity to reflect on this mystery, to discover something that might deepen that faith and transform our lives—if only a bit. For example, the goal of Jesus' ministry was the establishment of the reign of God. Everything he said and did pointed to this goal. He never faltered, never backed down in the face of opposition. He was steadfast in his commitment to what he believed was God's will for him, regardless of the price he might have to pay. And pay a tremendous price he did. Jesus' faithfulness to God's will is a model for us. We have responsibilities, some of which might make significant demands of us. Do we hold fast, or do we look for a way out? Holy Week calls us to follow him in his commitment.

Indigenous Reconciliation Fund: Thanks to the federal inquiry known as the *Truth and Reconciliation Commission*, which took place between 2008 and 2015, we now have a better understanding of what happened to Indigenous people in our country. The Commission in question recorded the testimonies of hundreds of residential school survivors. This same Commission issued 94 calls to action in order to right the legacy of the residential schools and to promote a road to reconciliation in Canada. Some of these calls for action were specifically addressed to the Catholic Church.

It is long overdue for Canadian society and the Church to pay genuine attention to Indigenous people and their culture as well as the challenges they are

facing. In recent decades, the Catholic Church has made efforts at reconciliation. It is now seeking to embark on a journey leading to reconciliation and solidarity. <u>During this Holy Week, let us pray to the Lord to help us move forward together towards healing and reconciliation</u>. - Archbishop Valéry Vienneau

Invitation to the Chrism Mass:



Naming Our Pastoral Unit

During the planning for, and in the discussions during, the Synod, it became obvious that our Pastoral Unit suffers from both a lack of an identity and the organizational structure to be as effective as we want it to be in meeting the needs of our parishioners. While our three parishes are unique and are parts of very different communities, we still share a

common mission, faith, and religion. As such, there is much that we share and it will be of benefit to each of the parishes if the pastoral unit is strong and vibrant, a source of unity and growth.

One of the first things needed for a sense of identity is a name, a name that speaks to who we are and whom we want to become. We will, therefore, take a first step in seeking this identity by choosing a name for our pastoral unit.

Over the course of the next three weeks parishioners are invited to suggest a name for our pastoral unit, keeping the following in mind:


- With the name provide a rationale for your choice. Explain how you think this name will contribute to creating a clear identify for the unit.
- The name cannot be one that is in use, or has been used, in the diocese.
 For example, St. Michael cannot be used since it was the name of a parish that closed some time ago. Duplication of names is just too confusing in searching records.
- Submit suggestions to sbhf@rogers.com, mail to St. Bernard's Office, or drop off at your parish office.

Deadline for suggestions is noon, April 29. More details on the process next week.

HOLY WEEK - RE-LIVE THE WEEK THAT CHANGED THE WORLD

The action of this week moves from the triumph of the palm procession, through the agony and death of the Lord, to his glorious resurrection from the dead. In Holy Week the people of God take time to reflect and pray about what Jesus has done for us in his love. We become more aware of the many ways in which we continue to live and experience the dying and rising of Jesus in our daily lives.



Chrism Mass (Bilingual): Tuesday, April 12th @ 6:30 PM at Our Lady of the Assumption Cathedral. Archbishop Valéry Vienneau will preside at this Mass as he blesses the oils for the anointing of the sick, chrism for baptism, confirmation, and ordination; and the oil of catechumens for those preparing for baptism. These oils will be used in celebrating the sacraments during the coming year.

Sacred Paschal Triduum: For three full days, from Holy Thursday evening to Easter Sunday, the Church celebrates the paschal mystery of Jesus Christ. This is his work of saving us by his dying and rising, seen as one act of God's love and mercy for us. We also celebrate because Jesus has brought us into his paschal mystery by baptism. With him we are baptized into death to sin, and with him we rise to live a new life for God.


HOLY THURSDAY - MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER - 7 PM

Reception of Oils: Oils will be received from the Chrism Mass.

Evening Mass: We remember the Passover feast of the Jewish people and the last supper of Jesus with his disciples when we celebrate the Eucharist this evening. Before he offers himself on the cross, Jesus takes bread and says, "This is my body". He takes a cup of wine, and says, "This is my blood of the new covenant, bloodshed to save all sinners. Do this in memory of me." We obey him each time we come together to celebrate the Eucharist.

Procession: At the end of the Mass, the Eucharistic food for the Good Friday celebration is carried reverently to a reserved place of honor. The altar is stripped, crosses are removed. **We leave in silence.**

Adoration: Members of the community are invited to spend time in prayer and adoration, praising the name of the Lord Jesus, by whose death and resurrection we are saved. The Church will remain open for Adoration until 9 PM.



GOOD FRIDAY

Spirit of the day: As we left in silence on Thursday we gather in silence on Friday. The meaning of this day is clearly indicated by its name in English: it is Good Friday, the day when God did wonderful things for us by the suffering and death of his Son. Out of his death God has brought us light and life and makes it possible for us to be saved. This is indeed a good day for the world.



For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

PASCHAL FAST

The Church of God fasts today and tomorrow to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus.

Good Friday is a universal day of fasting and abstinence from meat.



Children's Liturgy @ 10:00 AM

(For the children and their families)



Afternoon liturgy @ 3:00 o'clock - We come together to remember what Jesus has done for us. In the service of the word, we listen to the solemn proclamation of Jesus' passion according to John, and then offer prayer for the world and for God's people, the Church. We venerate the cross and eat the life-giving body of the Lord in communion.

HOLY SATURDAY



On this day, the body of Jesus lay in the guarded tomb, and the frightened disciples hid behind locked doors. In the modern Church, Holy Saturday is a quiet day, the great Sabbath rest. The paschal fast continues, and we avoid entertainments and distractions as on Good Friday.

Easter Vigil @ 8:30 PM: This service is the most important celebration of the Church year. It takes place during the dark hours of the night. It has four distinct stages:



Light service: After the blessing of the new fire, the priest lights the Easter candle. This represents the risen Lord, and is a visible reminder that Jesus is the light of the world.



Liturgy of the word: The readings from God's word lead us from creation through God's saving works to his greatest work, the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. We listen with faith, reflect on the word, and respond by singing psalms. The homily helps us to recognize God's mighty works in our midst.



Christian initiation: This year we do not have any elect for baptism. Our baptism into the death and rising of the Lord Jesus is at the center of tonight's celebration (Rom. 6:3-11). In each parish water for baptism is solemnly blessed. The people renew their baptismal vows and are invited to come to the font of blessed water in memory of their baptism. Tonight, is celebrated as the baptismal anniversary of the whole Christian community.



Eucharist: The first Mass of Easter is celebrated with great splendor. We rejoice because Christ has been raised from the dead and because we are renewed in him.

Dear Padre,

How should we dispose of last year's palms?

E very year on Passion Sunday (Palm Sunday), palm branches are handed out and blessed as a powerful reminder of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.

We keep palm branches for two reasons. First, they symbolize our desire to accompany Christ through Holy Week. Second, they symbolize Jesus' desire to enter our homes and accompany us on our journey as we face our own Good Fridays. Taking the palms home and placing them behind a crucifix or holy picture is a powerful reminder of that.

Many parishes ask their members to bring the palm branches they received the previous year to church on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. These



branches are burned to make the ashes that are distributed on Ash Wednesday. After a time, palm branches get brittle and break easily, so if your church doesn't collect them, it's OK to break the palms up and burn them yourself.

The number of palm branches we have in our homes isn't important. Palms and other articles of devotion such as medals and scapulars don't

bring good luck or wealth, and we shouldn't try to use them in that way. We should use them to remind us of the goodness of God and the salvation Christ brings us.
