


May 1, 2022 Third Sunday of Easter (C) Acts 5:27–32, 40b–41 Rev 5:11–14 Jn 21:1–19 or 21:1–14



Do You Love Me?

Three times Jesus asked Simon Peter: "Do you love me?" (John 21:16). This is the same Peter who earlier had sworn three times that, even if everyone else deserted Jesus, he never would. He was so sure of himself. Now, realizing the unreliability of his loyalty to Jesus, Peter is not so quick to answer with such self-confidence. Note that Peter did not reply with a straightforward, "Yes!" Rather, he amplified each response with the telling words: "You know...." With these words he acknowledged that Jesus could read his mind and heart, that he knew Peter's genuine love of him despite his all-too-human weakness. This itself was an act of faith.

This simple exchange did not humiliate Peter. That was not Jesus' way. They both understood what Peter had done, and they both knew how brokenhearted it had left him. Peter was humbled—not by Jesus, but by the recognition of his own human frailty. Despite this, or perhaps because of it, Jesus commissioned Peter to be leader among his followers. Another person might have chosen a more reliable man. However, there is great strength and wisdom in a leader who has learned from experience how circumstances might cause otherwise brave people to turn their backs on their responsibilities and run from danger. Such a leader will challenge while being compassionate and stand firm while being understanding. This is the kind of leader Jesus chose, for he knew that Peter would be that kind of leader.



Indigenous Reconciliation Fund: An incident which took place last year truly amplified the calls for a greater commitment from the Catholic Church. On May 27th, 2021, the Media began reporting nationwide that 215 bodies of children had been discovered in unmarked graves near the former Indian residential school in Kamloops. This and other such discoveries have led to significant progress in our Church, namely: a public apology coming from the Bishops, a delegation of indigenous people travelling to Rome, the Holy Father's acceptance to come to Canada, and a commitment from the Canadian bishops to contribute the sum of 30 million dollars to healing and reconciliation initiatives. The aforementioned efforts will contribute to a stronger foundation on

which to build our relationship with the indigenous peoples. **Our May 7th and 8th donations will allow the diocese to support local projects put forth by our Mi'gmaq communities**, namely: Elsipogtog First Nation, Bouctouche MicMac, Fort Folly First Nation and Indian Island First Nation. Along with chiefs and representatives from our indigenous communities, we will make every effort to identify projects based on their priorities. We hope to be able to foster initiatives in the following areas: 1) healing and reconciliation; 2) cultural and language revitalization; 3) education and early childhood development; and 4) promotion of indigenous culture and spirituality.



The Holy Father has asked all Catholic to intercede for vocations.


 \rightarrow Will you make a special effort to ask the Lord for more vocations to the priesthood and religious life?

By ancient tradition, the Old Testament is not read during the Easter Season. When there are three readings, the first is taken from the Acts of the **Apostles** or **Revelation**, the second from the Epistles.

Dear Padre,

Where was St. Joseph during Jesus' crucifixion?

t's impossible to know for certain when Joseph died, since the Gospels don't refer to it. By the time Jesus starts his public ministry, Joseph had disappeared. We know for sure that Joseph lived at least until Jesus was twelve (see Luke 2:42). While Joseph scholars have many ideas, most believe Joseph probably died around the time of Jesus'

baptism and before the wedding feast at Cana, when Jesus was about thirty years old (see Luke 3:23). That's because Mary is mentioned at the wedding feast, but Joseph is not (see John 2:1–12). And, while Jesus is preaching, the only ones looking for him are his "mother and brothers" (see Matthew 12:46–49, Mark 3:32– 34, and Luke 8:19–21).

Finally, while dying on the cross, Jesus entrusts his mother to the disciple John, who took her to his home (see John 19:27). If Joseph had been alive at the time,

this wouldn't have been necessary. Thus,

it's entirely likely that Joseph died with Jesus and Mary at his side, giving his death great significance in popular devotion. From ancient times, Christian traditions have held that Joseph died in the arms of the Virgin and Jesus. The origins of Joseph as the patron of a happy death can be seen as early as the second century.
