

Times Are a-Changin'

Today's Gospel expands a theme mentioned on the fourth Sunday of Easter, namely, change in religious practice. Many good people find some Second Vatican Council changes difficult to accept. For example, they may not like the new Mass form or leniency in Church discipline. They prefer Latin chants and the organ rather than folk music with guitars. This dissatisfaction is not necessarily because they are stubborn or unbending. It could be they were taught that the truth of the Church is eternal and unchanging, and want to see that reflected in the liturgy.

Actually, such understanding of the unchanging Church is only partially correct. The fundamentals of our faith as expressed in the Creed have not changed. It is the ways we understand or practice our faith that have gradually developed. For instance, the Mass is still the Mass, with three essential parts. Yet, the wording of some prayers have changed, and at Mass we stand more and kneel less. Most are cultural changes, but

there are some changes in theological understandings too. We now recognize the religious value of other faith traditions; interfaith marriage is allowed with special permission; and we understand the teachings of the Bible in new ways.

Today's reading from Acts shows that, from its beginning, the Church changed. Paul and Barnabas did not require Gentile believers to conform to circumcision—a Jewish practice, not Christian. Dissention arose. But the Holy Spirit helped the leaders in Jerusalem move beyond long-standing past practices and into a new way of being faithful. We believe the Holy Spirit continues to work through believers to ensure that the gospel is always faithful, yet newly meaningful.






World Day of Prayer for the Church in China - May 24

The Importance of Music Participation

By The Assembly in Liturgy

Liturgy is the public act of worship of the believing community.

In the liturgy we encounter God in word, in sacrament, and in the presider and assembly at prayer.

In the liturgy – the great act of giving praise and glory to God – music is a most concrete and expressive way of announcing

our belief and uniting our voices with one another.

Singing is the sign of the heart's joy (cf. Acts 2.46)

"There is also an ancient proverb: 'Whoever sings well prays twice over'."

The purpose of music in the liturgy is to give glory to God and to sanctify God's faithful people.

Communal song is a corporate act of prayer and praise. The foremost reason for all song during the liturgy is to give praise and thanks to God.

The texts will also shape our understanding of God's gracious love, the redemptive act of Christ and the Spirit-filled community of disciples.

Singing in the liturgy expresses and nurtures our love for one another. The unity of voices expresses the unity that exists among the members of Christ's body, the Church. Hymn texts used in the liturgy give us a common language with which to express our common faith.

Hymns function as formative instruments, providing images and metaphors rooted in the Sacred Scriptures which call us to an ever more committed life as disciples of the Lord.

Music in the liturgy is intended to foster the full, conscious and active participation of all the faithful in the Church's public prayer. By joining our hearts and minds together, knowing the mystery we celebrate and to whom we give praise and thanks, we are led to the kind of participation which is so earnestly desired by the pastors of the Church. Music is integral to the structure of all of our liturgical rites and therefore, integral to our worship of God.

All parishioners are encouraged, to lift up their voices in praise and joy at our liturgies.



Naming of our Pastoral Unit

Thank you to the twelve people who submitted suggestions for the name of our Pastoral Unit. There were two cases of duplicates so there were ten different suggestions and of these three are already in use in the diocese. As a result, a committee comprised of two people

from each of the three parishes met on Sunday last to short list the remaining seven. In a surprisingly short time, they chose the three suggestions that follow (with the rational provided). Please think about these, pray over them, discuss them, and ask the Holy Spirit to guide us in our discernment. Suggestions for the Name of Pastoral Unit

*Blessed Sacrament Pastoral Unit

The Catechism of the Catholic Church quotes Vatican II in section #1324 saying, "the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life." In #1398 the CCC says, The Eucharist and the unity of Christians. Before the greatness of this mystery St. Augustine exclaims, "O sacrament of devotion! O sign of unity! O bond of charity! "St. Thomas Aquinas said of the Eucharist," the Eucharist is the sacrament of love; it signifies love, it produces love. The eucharist is the consummation of the whole spiritual life." Because our three parishes are quite diverse in nature, we need a central focus that emphasizes who we are and what it is we have in common as Catholic communities. Nothing does this better both as sign and reality that the Eucharist, i.e. the Blessed Sacrament.

*St. Francis of Assisi Pastoral Unit

St Francis worried about the poor and vulnerable, and I feel that our 3 parishes strive to be attentive to the elderly, infirm, those who are hungry, struggling, and those new to the country. We know that there is more we can to and have a desire to do so.

St. Francis saw a role for the laity, when he was alive in the 1200's. In addition to starting religious orders for men and women; he also initiated an organization of lay people called to ministry. St. Francis had great love for all of God's creation. We live in a part of New Brunswick that provides us with many and varied opportunities to appreciate nature and creation. Rural and urban areas, forest and waters. We are proud of our beautiful region and can strive to continue to be good and better stewards of this beautiful earth and all who share it, with inspiration and guidance from *Laudato Si*. *The Good Shepherd Pastoral Unit

I looked up St. Bernard, St. Clement, St. Vincent trying to find a common ground among the three. Lots of common ground as one would expect! There are a lot of Clement's, Vincent's and Bernard's as Saints and popes! The I thought maybe the idea of moving forward in unity might be a common theme to follow. I came upon this verse: "I will whistle for them to come together." Zacharia 10:8. And later "I will strengthen them in the Lord, and they shall walk in his name, says the Lord. Zacharia 8:12That's what we need-strength and coming together. The Good Shepherd whistles for his sheep.

Dear Padre,

God gave humanity the skills for a child to be born to those suffering from infertility. So why does the Church oppose *in vitro* fertilization (IVF) after a couple has exhausted other options to conceive?

While the Church views having, raising, and educating children as a primary purpose of marriage, it also teaches that the means to achieve that goal must be morally appropriate. The Church considers *in vitro* fertilization (Latin for fertilization "in glass" or a laboratory) to be a morally inappropriate means for attainting that goal for two main reasons:

First, in practice, the IVF process almost always results in the destruction



of living human embryos that do not get implanted in the woman, which the Church considers morally equivalent to abortion. Second, just as the Church teaches contraception is wrong because it entails the willful separation of the natural ends of the marital act, it also teaches that IVF is wrong because it replaces the dignity of the marital act with a technical procedure. In other words, IVF supersedes the act God willed to be the genesis of new life.

In addition, IVF demeans the dignity of the spouses and their parental role (and the dignity of a third-party sperm or egg donor, if one is involved). All of this deprives the resulting child of a true filial

relationship with his or her parents, turning the child into a technological commodity rather than a gift from God.

Couples must be careful not to become so obsessed with pregnancy that they lose perspective and fail to see other expressions of marital generativity, such as adoption, that expand marriage and provide a home to children who wouldn't otherwise have one.
