



Why Is There Evil?

At some point in one's faith journey, every believer asks: If God is good and loving, why is there evil in the world? Why is there war? Why do children die prematurely? Why do pandemics rage? The biblical story of Job seeks to speak to that question, though it never really answers it.

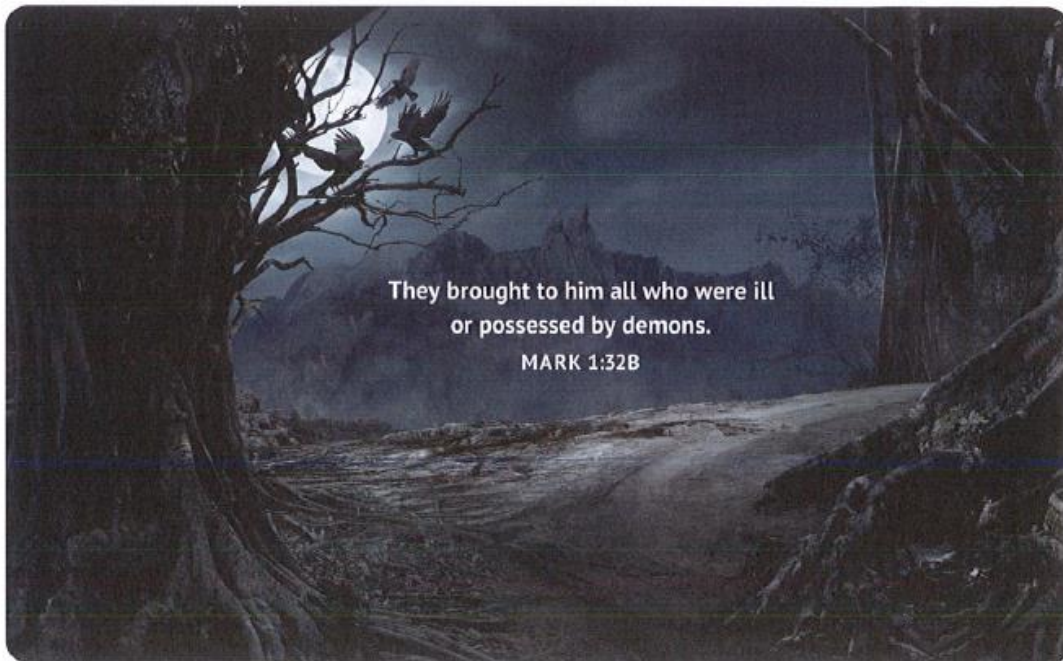
God and the satan (the name he is called in the Book of Job) are discussing Job and what a fine man he is. The satan suggests Job is a good man only because everything is going well for him. God then tells the satan that he may do whatever he wishes to test Job but may not harm him. By a series of catastrophes, then, Job loses his flocks, his camels, and even his sons and daughters. It is at this point that we hear today's first Scripture reading—Job's lament of misery and hopelessness.

Though Job's friends suspect that the cause of all

that has befallen him must be due to some grave sin on his part, Job denies this accusation and continues believing in the goodness of God, never wavering in his faith. Though frustrated by what life has brought, Job never blames God or asks God to fix his life. God is God, concludes Job, whether we understand the ways of life or not. To seek any more is to seek to be God. He continues to trust in God and admits that the ways of God are incapable of being understood. This becomes Job's only answer to the question about the "why" of evil. ●

Moncton, January 30, 2024

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

May God bless you as we begin the new year 2024!

It's indeed a year that's starting off on the right foot. Hallelujah!

As you are no doubt aware, the Archdiocese of Moncton has had to deal with the settlement of various legal claims made against former priests in our region for a number of years. Over the past 13 years, settling the claims of some 200 victims of abuse has required considerable effort and work to collect large sums of money. And God knows what sacrifices our parishes and the archdiocese have had to make to weather this unprecedented storm.

In order to meet the requirements of the court ruling, we had no recourse but to use the assets of the Archdiocese to meet the requirements of the ruling. Admittedly, these were difficult decisions to make, but they were necessary to avoid a major financial crisis, or even the bankruptcy of the Archdiocese, which would certainly have had an irreversible impact on the functioning or survival of all the parishes under our pastoral responsibility.

Despite our best efforts, we were still short by a considerable amount to meet the requirements imposed on us by the courts. At the beginning of September 2023, we had to borrow \$900,000 from the Bank to finance our current operations. What's more, we still had to disburse some \$5.4 million to finally bring the abuse case to a close. Since my arrival as Archbishop, Mgr Vienneau and I have embarked on a fund-raising campaign to pay the victims and the lawyers. In early December 2023, I wrote to all kinds of benefactors to help us overcome the looming crisis. Without hiding anything from these possible donors, I explained the dramatic financial situation that would lead us to contemplate insolvency (bankruptcy of the archdiocese).

It was at this point that a true miracle of Providence began to manifest itself to us just two weeks before the great feast of Christmas: the compassion and generosity of numerous benefactors who didn't even live in our diocese, suddenly enabled us to reposition ourselves financially. Thanks to their contributions, we were able to meet our financial and legal requirements, with a payment deadline of December 29, 2023. This is truly a miracle from God. Let's give Him thanks for this unspeakable favor!

I'm delighted that this new year has brought us a new outlook. I'm proud of the hard work accomplished by our parishioners, clergy, staff and volunteers. It's been a long and often difficult road. Now that our financial obligations have been met, we must turn the page, as I said in my homily on the day of my installation at Moncton Cathedral. On that day, I asked all those present: "Are you too ready to turn the page on the past of abuse? And everyone present that day answered loud and clear: "Yes!

Well, dear fellow priests, deacons, religious sisters and brothers, parishioners and faithful, the time has come for all of us to turn the page once and for all on this issue that has been more than thorny for so many years! We must now work together to find solutions that will enable us to rebuild our assets and properly support our operations and pastoral work. It goes without saying that strategic measures are required. So, in 2024, the Archdiocese will have to undertake this turning point by increasing the diocesan tax in order to rebuild the Archdiocese's finances. At present, we are the diocese with the lowest diocesan tax of all the Atlantic provinces. Other measures or projects will be undertaken and announced at a later date, in order to lift us up, not only financially, but also pastorally, morally and spiritually.

Dear parishioners, brothers and sisters, these are extraordinary measures because these are extraordinary times. Rest assured that we will do our best to find other ways to begin this journey of restoring the Archdiocese's finances. We will definitely do our best to communicate with you throughout this process.

My heart and vision for our archdiocese are for a living, missionary church whose apostolic zeal will be driven by the singular desire to bring Christ's message of hope and love to one and all. May the Holy Spirit guide us in this "synodal" journey, in this journey of solidarity and trust that now points to the horizon. May we all learn to walk together, hand in hand, respecting our different charisms and personalities, in order to accomplish the great task of evangelization that Jesus entrusts to each and every one of us.

*In the Our Father, we pray, “thy kingdom come.”
Will God’s kingdom come only at the end of the world?*

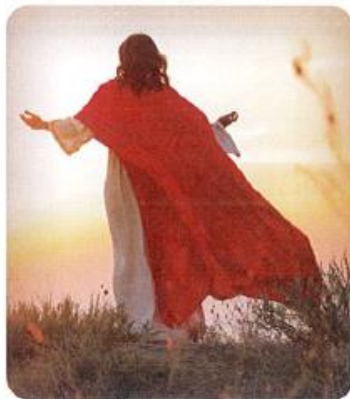
God’s kingdom will come in its fullness only at Jesus’ Second Coming, but the kingdom came into the world with Jesus’ first coming as a man. That means we are in God’s kingdom right now, but not in its fullness.

In the Scriptures, we read that John sends his disciples to ask Jesus if he is the messiah or if they need to wait for another. Jesus responds, “The blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, the poor have the good news proclaimed to them” (Luke 7:22). These are all signs of the kingdom of God.

In the meantime, we don’t have to just wait for God’s kingdom to come in its fullness. We can make God’s kingdom more of a reality on earth by visiting the sick, caring for the poor, and being kind to others. Loving your spouse is a sign of the kingdom of God. God’s kingdom is among us, not completely but partially, and we can make it more of a reality in the good that we do for each other.

Jesus’ Second Coming will be at the end of time, an event Jesus himself did not know the time of: “But of that day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father” (Mark 13:32). ●
